The first church was of brick, plain front, with a double row of windows, high pulpit, oil lamps, candles and old fashioned furniture. Mr. Webster, the sexton would fill the foot stoves with live coals to keep the women's feet warm.

For some time before 1835 the New Jersey Railroad and Transportation Co. had been surveying for its road-bed through the city. The line would pass through the First Baptist Church lot. In Dec. 1835, R.R. negotiations were entered into by the company with the Board of Trustees and the result was, the R.R. bought it. The trustees were Judge Runyon, Messrs. Dean and Randolph and Ambrose Randolph. Early in 1836 arrangements were made to buy the present lot, corner of George and Bayard Streets. A lot was purchased for a burying ground on the corner of George and Morris Streets and the remains of those buried in the churchyard removed to the new cemetery.

The twenty-two years Rev. Greenleaf S. Webb was pastor, from 1821-1843, were years of spiritual uplift; the great historic revival of 1827 began in the First Baptist Church and extended to all the churches in the city - 157 were added by baptism to the church.

With the money from the sale of the church property and additional subscriptions, the present large, handsome edifice was built and was ready for occupancy early in 1838. The cost of the building and furnishings was about \$19,000.

In 1843 the pastor and some of the members of the First Baptist Church began to hold services regularly in the school house at George's Road and the result was, forty persons were baptised and joined the church, but very soon a church was formed out there and they were transferred to George's Road Baptist Church.
