

The following names were among the most active  
and distinguished members:-

Rev. William Beatty followed in 1863, remained  
four years. When he resigned, his congregation ex-  
pressed their love for him in a gift of \$500. He was  
the father of Madame Louise Homer.

Crossby, professor of Greek in Rutgers College  
succeeded him in 1861, stayed only one year, but left  
every department stimulated and strengthened by his  
touch. Later he became chancellor of New York  
University.

Davidson, who wrote a "Historical Sketch of the First  
Presbyterian Church" served until 1859. Dr. Howard  
Crosby, professor of Greek in Rutgers College
