

DEMOCRATS GET LAST BUT ONE OF BIG STATE JOBS

TRENTON, April 3—The last, but one, of the lucrative and influential heads of the state departments that a few days ago were all held by the Republicans, will in a few days pass into the control of the Democrats, when Robert H. McAdams, of Elizabeth, will succeed Samuel K. Robbins, Republican, as clerk in chancery. The term of Mr. Robbins will expire on Wednesday, April 15, and on that day Mr. McAdams will take the oath of office and assume his new duties. The term of the clerk in chancery is five years, and the salary is \$6,000.

The office of the court of chancery is one of the busiest departments in the state house. Mr. McAdams will have under him nearly 40 employees and will handle the business which during the last fiscal year required an expenditure of about \$40,000.

Some idea of the magnitude of the work that Mr. McAdams will direct may be gained from the fact that during the past year more than 9,000 suits were started in this court. Every suit means the handling, docketing and filing of from 5 to 15 papers.

Keyant Lone Republican.
The one lone department head left to the Republicans after April 15 will be the chief of the Department of Labor, held by General Lewis T. Bryant of Atlantic City, who was reappointed by Woodrow Wilson, when governor, upon the ground that he had made such a good record in the office that he should not be displaced.

This reappointment was urged by the organized labor throughout the state. General Bryant's administration of the department of labor has recently been under fire of the economy and efficiency commission, and a minority of that commission recommended to the legislature his dismissal. Nothing has been done, however, in this matter.

Democrats Hold These Jobs.
Here are the heads of the departments, with the salary of each, that have passed from Republican to Democratic control since the landslide which swept Woodrow Wilson into the governorship and made the state Democratic:

Secretary of state, \$6,000; state treasurer, \$6,000; state comptroller, \$6,000; attorney general, \$7,000; clerk of the supreme court, \$6,000; commissioner of banking and insurance, \$6,000; commissioner of education, \$10,000; state prison keeper, \$2,500; chief of the bureau of statistics, \$2,500; state road commissioner, \$5,000.

In nearly all these cases the deputies have also become Democrats, with salaries ranging from \$2,000 to \$4,000.

MARRIED IN HER TEENS, IN 2 YEARS WANTS A DIVORCE

TRENTON, April 3—Briefs in the divorce suit of Mrs. Irma Lee Earl against her husband, Binney Woodward Earl, a well known resident of Burlington and Edgewater Park, have been filed by counsel with the Court of Errors and Appeals, where the case is now pending. The case is before the Errors Court, upon the appeal of the husband from the decree of the Court of Chancery granting Mrs. Earl a divorce.

The case became one of the most noted in this state in recent years, because of the sensational features attending it. The marriage took place in 1909 and was a runaway match. Earl, who was of a wealthy family, was 22 years old, and his bride was in her teens. Until the December following, they lived with Earl's mother in Burlington and then went to Edgewater Park, where Earl's mother had built them a home. They separated in October 1911. Immediately thereafter, Mrs. Earl brought this suit for a divorce, charging her husband with breaking his marriage vows.

Earl denied his wife's charge, and filed a cross petition charging his wife with infidelity. He named Mark Whitfield, a servant in their home, as co-respondent. One of the features which has made the case noted is that it turned largely upon the question that if both allegations were true, which of the parties had been guilty first. After hearing the evidence in the case, the Court of Chancery decided that the charges against Mrs. Earl had not been proven, and that she had made out her case. She was thereupon granted a divorce.
