The office of the court of chancers is one of the busiest departments in the state house. Mr. McAdams will have under him nearly 40 employes and will handle the business which during the last fiscal year required an expenditure of about \$40,000.

Some idea of the magnitude of the work that Mr. McAdams will direct may be gained from the fact that during the past year more than 9,000 suits were started in this court. Every suit means the handling, docketing and filing of from 5 to 15 papers.

Bryant Lone Republican.
