Miss Sophie Beyer Commits Suicide signals. Suddenly, the passengers in at Her Home on Jersey Avenue. Father Finds Her Body in Closet.

### WAS DESPONDENT POR SEVERAL DAYS

Miss Sophie Beyer, a pretty eighteen) year old girl grieving over some unknown trouble, ended her life during the night by cutting her throat and drinking carbolic acid. Her lifeless body was found by her father, August Beyer, and her sister about 4 o'clock this morning in a clothes closet, just off of her bedroom, at her home, 31 Jersey avenue.

The girl had been employed in the cigar factory. She had always been bright and cheenful, of a most happy disposition, the life of any party. Her friends had noticed a marked change in her in the last three or four weeks.
